Can you imagine what life would be like if you couldn't see? At a new exhibition, you can experience the world using your other senses: touch, hearing, smell, taste and sense of balance to 'see' without using your eyes. Learn to understand beauty in a totally new way! Find out what things look like when you are not looking at all!

At the Invisible Exhibition, you can learn about the practical aspects of being blind. 100 years of memory and legend

On 10 April 1912, an amazing, imposing new ocean liner steamed out of Southampton Harbour. \(^1\)___ She was the largest ship in the world at that time, and the most luxurious. Her passengers included some of the wealthiest people in the world. Everyone agreed this beautiful new ship was the best liner in existence – in fact, she was said to be unsinkable.

The ship's crew had absolute confidence in her. When, four days later, Captain Edward Smith gave his radiomen the order to transmit the international distress signal, SOS, they thought he was joking. He wasn't. At 2.20 a.m. on 15 April 1912, the *Titanic* sank beneath the freezing waters of the Atlantic. ²_____ It is still one of the biggest peacetime maritime tragedies in history.

On 14 April 2012, a passenger ship stopped in the North Atlantic. ³_____ It was cold and dark. 1,300 passengers stood on deck as a memorial service was held for the people who died there. After hymns and prayers, two wreaths of flowers were thrown into the freezing water.

The story of the *Titanic* has touched and fascinated people for over a century. Mistakes were made that added up to disaster. ⁴_____ There are records of generosity and courage that saved lives when so many others were lost. Millionaire Benjamin Guggenheim was offered one of the few places in a lifeboat, but said it should be given to a woman or a child, and chose instead to dress for dinner. Someone overheard him say 'We've dressed up in our best and are prepared to go down like gentlemen!' ⁵_____ The pure drama of the scene means that the legend of the *Titanic* will never be forgotten.

A degree in what?

How many people in the world have a university degree in *enigmatology*? Well, not many. As a matter of fact, the number of enigmatology graduates in the whole world is just one: a man whose job it is to design puzzles for newspapers and magazines.

American Will Shortz is an author and crossword editor. He has worked on over a hundred books, and he owns the world's largest collection of puzzle books and magazines. The oldest title in his collection was published in 1545! And because his work is also his hobby, he has always been interested in learning as much as possible about the subject.

Obviously, because he is the only enigmatologist in the world, there were no university professors who could teach him an established course of studies. He did not go to lectures and classes like his fellow students. Shortz designed his own research programme, which the university accepted, and he completed his course and received his bachelor's degree from Indiana University in 1974.

So the question remains, what exactly is enigmatology? It is the study of puzzles: their types, their history, and their popularity. It's a mixture of history, maths, logic and cultural studies.

There were some people who criticised the university for offering a course in such a strange subject, and they were also critical of Shortz, claiming that he had taken advantage of Indiana University's flexibility. But Shortz has his fans too, such as the former US president Bill Clinton. He sent Shortz a personal note on his 50th birthday because he loves the *New York Times* crossword, which Shortz edits. Shortz has also been a guest on several television shows, including an episode of the famous cartoon *The Simpsons*, and the comedy series *How I Met Your Mother*, where he played himself.

To smoke or not to smoke?

Laws that ban smoking in public places are not exactly a new idea. One of the world's first smoking bans was introduced in 1575, when the Roman Catholic Church passed a law that made it illegal to smoke in any church in the Spanish colonies of Central America. In the eighteenth century, a number of German and Austrian cities also banned smoking, not in specific locations or buildings, but anywhere in the city. Some of these bans were based on ideas about health. Others were more concerned with safety. The Old Government Building in Wellington, New Zealand banned smoking in the 19th century because the building was made entirely of wood; smoking was a fire risk.

In the second half of the twentieth century, campaigns began to make people aware of the health dangers of smoking, and the concept of *passive smoking* – or breathing other people's smoke – became a widespread concern. As a result, governments passed laws in the 1970s to control the use of tobacco, and restaurants and other public places began to create smoking and non-smoking sections. But it wasn't until the late 1990s that public smoking bans became widespread. California led the way in the US when it became the first US state to prohibit smoking in all public places in 1998. By 2010, nearly eighty percent of American states had introduced smoking bans. Elsewhere, ventilation systems were installed in public places, and smokers' lounges were created as alternatives to complete bans.

Not everyone is happy about the introduction of smoking bans. Not surprisingly, tobacco companies, restaurants and bars are concerned about losing business because of the new restrictions. Smokers often complain that by limiting the places where they can smoke, smoking bans unfairly limit their freedom. Plus, it is difficult to break the habit and give up smoking. But nowadays most people accept the overwhelming scientific evidence that smoking harms our health and can cause lung and heart disease. Furthermore, research shows that smoking bans have resulted in a reduction in smoking-related diseases and deaths. We shall have to see whether in the future every country in the world will follow suit and impose bans on smoking in public places.

A capsule fails the test of time

The US state of Oklahoma, the 48th state in the Union, celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2007. In a year full of official celebrations, one event in June attracted spectators and media from all around the world. On 15 June 2007, thousands of people gathered in Tulsa to watch the unearthing of a time capsule that had been buried half a century ago in 1957. There was a feeling of excitement in the air. As well as waiting to see the time capsule, the crowd was also waiting to find out who had won a competition which had been launched when the capsule was buried 50 years earlier.

The time capsule was a large reinforced concrete box. People said it was strong enough to survive a nuclear strike. It had to be large and strong, because it contained a car: a brand new 1957 Plymouth Belvedere. Inside the car were lots of everyday items from the 1950s. For example, there was a jerry can of petrol and a case of beer in the boot. In the glove compartment was a handbag containing a lipstick and other small items considered essential for a 'typical' woman in the 1950s. A savings account was also opened in 1957, and \$100 was deposited in it. By 2007, this prize fund was worth about \$1,200. But the main attraction was the car.

Before the capsule was buried, officials ran a competition. Entrants had to guess what the population of Tulsa would be in 2007. The organisers recorded all the guesses and saved them on a roll of microfilm. The microfilm was placed in the Plymouth Belvedere. The organisers' idea was that when the time capsule was opened in 2007, the winner would be announced – and he or she (or his or her heirs) would win the entire contents of the time capsule, plus the contents of the savings account.

In the centre of Tulsa on 15 June 2007, thousands of people came to see the opening of the capsule. Diggers dug down and exposed the large concrete box. The crowd heard a dramatic drum-roll as the time capsule was opened and a large crane lifted the car out of the ground. But cheers turned to gasps as the crowd saw the rusting, muddy shape that was raised out of the hole. Water had penetrated the concrete casing and the beautiful chromed vehicle was in a sorry state. The beer cans were rusty, the handbag was a solid lump of leather and the microfilm had apparently disintegrated. The winner would never be known.

As publicity stunts go, it was a bit of a disaster. But Tulsans took the setback with a smile! The sense of connection with the past, and the feeling of taking part in an event that had been planned half a century ago, was worth more to them than the sight of a gleaming vintage car!

The Dakar Rally

You've probably heard of the off-road motor vehicle rally called the Dakar Rally, but do you know where is finishes? Before you say Dakar, the capital of Senegal, think again! The last time the rally finished in Dakar itself was in 2007. In 2008, because of concerns about security, the rally was cancelled and a shorter, less challenging race called the Central Europe Rally was held in its place. And since 2009, the Dakar Rally has been held in South America due to the increasing risk of terrorism in Senegal.

The first Dakar Rally was held in 1978. During a race in 1977, a French competitor, Thierry Sabine, had got lost on his motorcycle in the Libyan desert. Having been rescued, he returned to France convinced that the desert landscape would provide a fantastic challenge for an international competition. The Dakar Rally began the next year, and for the next fifteen years, hundreds of drivers and motorcyclists competed in the annual long-distance race. Competitors would drive from Paris to the Mediterranean, then across the north-western corner of Africa to the Senegalese capital, trying to avoid getting lost in the desert sandstorms. Then things became complicated: the region became more and more politically unstable, and officials have had to change the starting point, rally route and finishing line of the race nearly every year since 1994.

The Dakar Rally has always been highly competitive. Each year, more than 350 car and truck drivers and motorcycle riders enter the rally, about 80 per cent of whom are amateurs. Unsurprisingly, the majority of winners have been professionals. The most successful Dakar competitor is Stephane Peterhansel, who won the rally six times riding a motorbike, before switching to a car and winning a further four titles between 2004 and 2012.

The rally has been subject to a lot of criticism. Many people have protested against it because of the impact it has on the environment. Others are upset by the fact that the race passes through countries where many people make less money in their whole lives than a wealthy competitor spends during a single rally. Nevertheless, the famous race remains as popular as ever. Among rally drivers and car companies, as well as fans who enjoy the thrill of following the progress of their favourite competitors, the Dakar Rally is still one of the most important off-road racing competitions in the world.

Advertising in the information age

As new forms of communication are developed, so the world of advertising is changing in response. Basic ideas which advertisers have always believed are being challenged. For example, it used to be said that the more people you reached, the better it was for your business. Not any more!

Today, people are bombarded by information from television, the Internet, newspapers, magazines and countless other media sources. A marketing campaign has to be good to stand out amongst all of these competing messages. Because of this, businesses should aim to get their message not to the *most* people, but to the *right* people. This is especially important for small businesses – but how can they do this?

Instead of buying expensive advertising space in magazines, or investing in radio and television airtime, the latest advice is to advertise only to potential customers. If you own a local hairdresser's, for example, it is better to post leaflets to all the households in your neighbourhood than to advertise on national television. Ask shops that attract similar customers, such boutiques or cosmetics shops, to keep your brochures next to their tills. In exchange, you can do the same for them.

Forget general messages; advertise current offers instead. 'Have your hair coloured and get a twenty per cent discount throughout January!' will work better than 'Great hairstyles to suit all tastes'. Find out about local events and use them in your promotion. Messages like 'Wouldn't you love a cool new hairstyle for your school graduation next month?' will show that you know your customers and are familiar with their needs.

Use the Internet. A website is a cost-effective way of communicating a lot of information: the location of your business, your opening times, your prices, your staff, and so on. That way, you can print simpler brochures. People rarely bother to read advertising literature with too much information. Simply print your main message and add your website address. Potential customers who want to know more about you will know where to look

Finally, make use of your customers. Make sure they are happy with your services, and ask them to recommend you to their friends. Ask them for their email addresses so that you can keep them informed about special offers. If they agree, there is a good chance that they will forward your emails to their friends. Word of mouth is the best advertising there is.

An unusual string quartet

What do you do after you have completed your studies in classical music at a famous music academy? Well, if you are like Eicca Toppinen, Paavo Lötjönen, Max Lilja and Antero Manninen, you form a heavy metal band, of course! But not just any band. The four friends left the Sibelius Academy in Helsinki in 1993 and formed a grouped called Apocalyptica, one of the most successful heavy metal bands today, selling millions of albums around the world.

What brought the four young men together was their shared love for the band Metallica. At first, their dream was simply to play their favourite Metallica songs. What makes Apocalyptica unusual among heavy metal bands is that the musicians play cellos, not electric guitars. Their first album, released in 1996, had a title that explained it all – *Apocalyptica Plays Metallica by Four Cellos*.

The band became an unexpected international success. They received invitations to play with some of the biggest bands in rock, and performed at many festivals around Europe and the United States. Although the friends never expected to make a career in rock music, they have recorded seven more albums to date – all worldwide hits. Eicca and Paavo still play together, but Max Lilja and Antero Manninen have been replaced by Perttu Kivilaakso, another cello graduate of the Sibelius Academy, and professional drummer Mikko Sirén.

Apocalyptica have come a long way since 1993. They still play the music they loved listening to as teenage fans, but now they write most of their own material. Their fourth album, *Reflections*, released in 2003, was the first one to feature only original tracks by Apocalyptica. For songs that need a singer, they invite famous guest stars like Ville Valo of the band HIM, Till Lindemann of Rammstein or Gavin Rossdale of Bush.

The most ironic moment of their career came in November 2008. Their hit *I Don't Care* appeared in third place on the Billboard chart, ahead of Metallica who managed only fourth place! Later, with the same song, Apocalyptica became the first Finnish band ever to reach the top of the US charts.

Interviewer ... with us in the studio is psychologist Dr Stephen Willard. He's here to talk to us about memory. Good evening, Dr Willard.

Dr Willard Good evening.

Interviewer Now, what do psychologists mean by memory?

Dr Willard Well, 'memory' is the ability to store and recall information and experiences. This involves three steps. First, we register the information – that is, we change it into a form that the brain can understand. Next, we store it in our mind. Finally, we retrieve it – or recall it, in other words.

Interviewer How much can the average person remember?

Dr Willard That's a complicated question. You see, there are different types of memory. There is short-term memory, for example, which we use to store a small amount of information for a short time. Imagine we ask for a person's phone number, and then pick up our own phone to dial the number. Most of us find it difficult to remember the number. We tend to repeat the numbers over and over until we have finished dialling. However, we can improve our short-term capacity by 'chunking'. It's easier to memorise a ten-digit phone number if we break it down into chunks – say, three numbers, then another three, then the final four numbers – than it is to memorise the numbers one by one.

Interviewer How can we remember things for longer?

Dr Willard Lots of things can help us store information in our long-term memory. Repetition is one. The more often we use information, the easier it is to recall it. Using a logically organised system is also helpful. We can recall related information more easily than random bits of information. Emotions also have a powerful impact – we remember emotionally positive or negative events more clearly and in more detail than neutral events. Finally, we know that sleep is important because it helps our brain to arrange the information we collected during the day for easier recall later on.

Interviewer So it's better to read your notes carefully before an exam and go to sleep than to keep studying through the night?

Dr Willard Yes, that's exactly how it works ... [fade]

When people talk about mysteries, they often think about places like the Bermuda Triangle or Loch Ness. The place I visited is less mysterious, but the experience had a huge effect on me.

A couple of years ago my friend Kate persuaded me to go on holiday to Malta with her. I expected the usual sort of summer holiday, but instead of lying on the beach or clubbing all night, Kate's plan was to explore the island's history, culture and traditions – far more interesting than beaches, clubs and bars!

We visited several of the island's many churches. We saw the Mosta Dome, the third largest dome in the world, and learned what happened during the Second World War on the 9th of April 1942. A bomb fell on the church, landed in the middle of the 300 people there ... and didn't go off. Everyone survived unharmed.

On the nearby island of Gozo we saw another church which has a dome that is larger than the one at St Paul's Cathedral in London. The church can hold 3,000 people, which means the whole village can go to church at the same time! We also saw old temples built in the Stone Age, about 6,000 years ago. I loved the sense of time that they give you. The really intriguing thing about them, though, is that the civilisation that built these temples used them for a thousand years – and then simply disappeared!

But the strangest thing we saw was a rock formation. There are marks in the rock that look like train tracks, forming an enormous network. It looks like an unused train station, and an Englishman named it Clapham Junction – after the railway station in London. Some people say the rock is soft and that carts with wooden wheels must have left their mark in the rock. Others say the tracks may have been canals used to transport water. It's definitely one of the most curious things I've ever seen in my life.

Man So, what was the most interesting art exhibition you've ever seen?

Woman Probably one I saw in London a few years ago. I spent my summer holiday there, and one rainy

day I visited the National Gallery. What amazed me most was that almost all the paintings were

fakes. They weren't genuine.

made in the past. One mistake in 1845 cost the keeper – that's the person in charge of the gallery – his job. The gallery paid a lot of money for a painting they thought was by Hans Holbein, but

actually, it was painted at least seventeen years after the artist had died!

Man How embarrassing! What about other big mistakes?

Woman Well, on one occasion they bought what they thought were two paintings by Botticelli. They paid

about 1,000 pounds for one of them - a lot of money at the time - and more than 1,600 for the other one. It turns out that the cheaper one is genuine, but the more expensive one probably isn't.

Man Any other nasty surprises?

Woman Well, there are some long-running disputes! The most well-known is probably the story of The

Madonna of the Pinks. It was bought by the gallery in 2004. The seller had always thought the picture was a copy of a painting by Raphael, but the expert from the gallery disagreed. He thought it was a genuine Raphael. However, the painting was going to be sold to an American collector and the gallery was very keen to keep it in Britain. They had to raise a lot of money to be able to buy it for the National Gallery. In fact, they paid over £22 million for it. A lot of people criticised the museum's expert for wasting the National Gallery's money on a copy, but he was sure that the painting was genuine and that it was worth every penny they paid for it! The

debate continues to this day.
